

This Sunday 8th June we celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the opening of our church building at Whitemoss with concelebrated Mass at 2pm in the Church followed immediately by a reception and meal in the Ballerup Hall. <u>All Parishioners are cordially invited to attend the Jubilee Mass</u>, and 220 have signed up to attend the reception along with our invited guests.

The Viridor (Legacy) Fund Application: the deadline for this application is 16th June. The Diocese is directing this programme which is more ambitious than our intended re-building of the wall which faces on to Platthorn Drive and the repair of the parapet above it. The Diocese will report to us from time to time on the outcome of the application and the progress which they make.

The Viridor (Ordinary) Fund Application: The Parish has lodged this application and will direct the building programme if a Grant is made to us at Viridor's next meeting. Optimistically, we hope to be offered £71,636.76 against the approved expenditure of £80k for an extension of the Hall.
