



ASSUMPTA EST VIRGO MARIA...

n Tuesday, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Assumption of Our Lady into heaven. It is the oldest feast day of Mary, the mother of Jesus.

Its origin is lost in those days when Jerusalem was restored as a holy place during the reign of the Emperor Constantine, that is to say, from the year 312AD onwards. In 135AD the Emperor Hadrian (the same one who ordered the building of 'Hadrian's Wall', stretching from the Solway Firth to the River Tyne, as the northerly border in Britannia in 122AD) obliterated all trace of Jesus from the Jerusalem, and pagan temples were built over the holy places associated with his life.



In the Fourth century, after the Empire Roman had embraced Christianity, the pagan temples were destroyed, and basilicas began to be built to commemorate the events of Our Lord's life on the same spots. mother Mary Jesus' was not forgotten. Memories of her centred around the so-called 'Tomb of Mary' near the site where the Jewish Temple had once stood - it was called the place of her 'dormition' or 'falling

asleep', that is, where Mary is said to have died, the tomb being her burial spot. The Abbey of the Dormition, which is run by German Benedictines, is found here today.

Mary's death began to be celebrated by the Christian community in Jerusalem in the fourth century; by the seventh century it was being celebrated in Rome under the title of the 'Falling Asleep', in Latin '*Dormitio'*, of the Mother of God. Soon the name was changed to the 'Assumption of Mary', since there was more to the feast than her dying: the feast began to underline that Mary had been taken up, body and soul, into heaven. That belief was ancient, dating back to the apostles themselves: in 451AD, when bishops from the Mediterranean world gathered in Constantinople for a Council, the Emperor Marcian asked the Bishop of Jerusalem to bring the relics of Mary with him. The Bishop explained to the Emperor that there were no relics of Mary in Jerusalem, and that: "Mary had died in the presence of the apostles; but her tomb, when opened later . . . was found empty and so the apostles concluded that the body was taken up into heaven."

In 1950, in the Apostolic Constitution *Munificentissimus Deus* (the Most Generous God) Pope Pius XII proclaimed the Assumption of Mary a dogma of the Catholic Church in these words: "The Immaculate Mother of God, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heaven." Why? The Assumption completes God's work in her since it was not fitting that the flesh, which had given life to God's Son, should ever undergo the corruption of death. The feast turns our eyes in the direction of heaven where Mary has gone, we hope to follow. **Father McGachey**

THE NATIONAL PILGRIMAGE IN HONOUR OF MARGARET SINCLAIR - SUNDAY 17th SEPTEMBER

The 2023 National Pilgrimage to pray for the Beatification of Venerable Margaret Sinclair [the Edinburgh woman, who became a Carmelite nun in London] (-1925), will take place on Sunday 17th September, from 12.30pm until 6pm, at St Patrick's Church, Cowgate, Edinburgh. Refreshments and the sale of candles and goods, from 12.30pm until 1.50pm; Holy Hour with Rosary, Confession and Benediction from 2pm; Reflection and Novena Prayers from 3pm. Holy Mass at 4.30pm. All welcome.

THE HOLY OILS

Since Holy Thursday, when the Holy Oils were blessed at the Chrism Mass in the Cathedral by the Bishop, the Oil of the Sick, the Oil of Catechumens and the Oil of Chrism have been displayed at the Baptismal Font. They are there since Saint Bride's does not have an 'Ambry' - a special tabernacle-like box, traditionally located near by the Baptismal Font, for storing the Oils. A gentle reminder that the Holy Oils are blessed, and as such, should only be used in the celebration of the Sacraments and administered by the priest.

CALENDAR



Monday is memorial of Saint Maximilian Kolbe (+1941). Born in Poland, he joined the Franciscan Order and founded the *Militia of Mary Immaculate* to promote devotion to the Mother of God. After a time as a missionary in Japan, he returned to Europe, where he was an outspoken critic of the Nazis. As a result, he was imprisoned in Auschwitz, where he would volunteer to take the place of the father

of a large family who was to be executed in 1941. He was canonised by Pope Saint John Paul. **Tuesday** is the **Solemnity of the Assumption of Our Lady into heaven** - see front cover. We honour the Christian King, **Saint Stephen of Hungary** (+1038) on **Wednesday**. Through his holiness and zeal, he consolidated the Christian Faith in his country, founding Dioceses and Monasteries. He was crowned King on Christmas Day in the year 1000.

Thursday is the memorial of **Our Lady of Knock**, which remembers the apparition of Our Lady, Saint Joseph and Saint John the Evangelist, on the wall of the parish church in the village of Knock, County Mayo in 1879. **Saturday** is the memorial of **Saint John Eudes** (+1680). Born in Normandy, he studied in Paris and was ordained to the Priesthood. An outstanding preacher, he founded the Society of Jesus and Mary (commonly called the *Eudists*) to preach parish missions in rural France. He promoted devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, based on the apparitions of Christ to Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque.
