## THE VENERABLE MARGARET SINCLAIR

The other evening, while still on holiday, I stumbled across a video on Youtube chronicling the six-day visit of Pope Saint John Paul II to Britain in 1982, titled - *John Paul II: The Pilgrim Pope - Pastoral Visit to Great Britain May 1982* – it is well worth watching, if you get the chance.



I watched with interest the section detailing the Papal Mass at Bellahouston - 300,000 people gathered from across the country on a beautiful June day - the biggest single gathering of people in the history of Scotland. I was struck by how the Pope focused on the lives of the holy men and women associated with Scotland, including Margaret Sinclair - a name that will be familiar to people of a certain vintage. Her ordinary life, as well as her search for holiness, deserve to be better known!

Margaret Sinclair was born at Middle Arthur Place, Edinburgh, in a tenement basement flat. She was one of six children born to her parents Elizabeth and Andrew Sinclair, who worked for the Cleansing Department of the local Council. Margaret was baptised at her local parish, Saint Patrick's Church,

Cowgate on 11<sup>th</sup> April 1900. Educated at Saint Anne's School, Margaret took a certificate in sewing, cooking and dressmaking. During a long illness suffered by her mother, she stayed off school to nurse her, and had a spare-time job scrubbing floors and running errands for a local seamstress.

When her father and elder brother, John, were called-up to fight in the First World War, she left school at fourteen and worked full-time as a French polisher and became an active member of her trade union. Margaret, and her sister Bella, struggled to support their mother with their low wages, and at the end of the War, with the arrival of the inevitable economic slump, Margaret found herself unemployed; however, she gained new employment at the McVitie's biscuit factory.

While Bella became a Little Sister of the Poor, looking after those living in poverty, Margaret felt called to a more contemplative lifestyle. When her application to join the Poor Clares in Edinburgh was turned down (because of problems in the community), she applied to join the Poor Clares in Notting Hill, London.

She entered in July 1923, taking the name Sister Mary Francis of the Five Wounds. Some of her fellow sisters looked down on her as no more than a working-class girl, with little education, imagining that the hours spent singing the Divine Office in Latin, would be too much for her. Her experience of convent life was similar to that of many other religious: there were personality clashes and cultural differences that caused friction; at times some of her fellow sisters regarded her as disobedient and even annoying. Yet, Margaret's ability to work and pray had freed her from her lowly background, and allowed her to find God in prayer and penance.

As an enclosed Order, the convent relied on 'extern sisters' as their link with the outside world: their vow of poverty required them to survive on what could be obtained through donations and begging; this was Margaret's job and she worked hard to help her community.

In 1925, Margaret was diagnosed with tuberculosis and admitted to a sanatorium run by the Sisters of Charity in Essex - there she would remain until she died on 24<sup>th</sup> November that same year. She was buried at Kensal Green in northwest London, but in 1927 her body was re-interred at Mount Vernon Cemetery, Edinburgh, and on the 25<sup>th</sup> October 2003 her remains were again exhumed and placed in a side altar in her parish church - Saint Patrick's in Edinburgh. Margaret Sinclair declared *Venerable* - one of the steps on the road to being declared a saint - by Pope Paul VI in 1978, the hundredth anniversary of the restoration of Scotland's Catholic hierarchy.

At Bellahouston Park in 1982, Pope John Paul II said of her: "Margaret could well be described as one of God's little ones, who through her very simplicity, was touched by God with the strength of real holiness of life, whether as a child, a young woman, an apprentice, a factory worker, a member of a Trade Union or a professed Sister of religion." # THURSDAY 2<sup>nd</sup> FEBRUARY FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF THE LORD IN THE TEMPLE



This Feast falls on the fortieth day after Christmas and commemorates how the infant Jesus was presented by Mary and Joseph in the Temple in Jerusalem, and met by the elderly Simeon and Anna.

For centuries, it has been the day for blessing the candles used in the Church; it is sometimes called Candlemas Day. The beautiful ceremony will take place at the beginning of the 10am Mass today, and will be

followed by a short candlelight procession around the Church and sung Mass, with organ and incense. Please join us if you can for this beautiful Feast.

We will bless candles for use in our homes the following weekend, 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> February, at each of the Sunday Masses. These candles, modestly priced, may be purchased, if so desired.

Our faith teaches us that very Catholic home should have at least two blessed candles for use when the Blessed Sacrament is brought to someone sick or housebound, for the administration of the Sacrament of the Sick, to burn in the presence of a corpse - as a mark of vigil and respect - and at times of danger, blessing or family prayers. Do you have blessed candles at home?

#### FRIDAY 3rd FEBRUARY - FEAST OF SAINT BLAISE

Saint Blaise was a bishop and martyr who, for many centuries, has been the patron Saint of those with ailments of the throat.

We know that Blaise lived in Armenia and worked hard to promote the spiritual and physical health of his people. Eventually, he was arrested for his Christian faith, and when in prison, a woman came with her young son who had a fish bone fixed in his throat. At Blaise's command, the child was able to cough up the bone. He was martyred in 316AD. By the year 800 the custom of blessing throats, using the blessed candles from the previous day's feast (see above), spread across Europe. The traditional Blessing of Throats will be given on his feast day at the 10am Mass.

Since most parishioners will not be able to attend Mass on the 3rd, the blessing will also be given at the end of each of the Sunday Masses on the  $4^{th}$  and  $5^{th}$  of February.





# SATURDAY 11<sup>th</sup> FEBRUARY FEAST OF OUR LADY OF LOURDES

We remember how Our Blessed Lady appeared to a poor teenager, Bernadette Soubirous, in the town of Lourdes in 1858. She asked Bernadette to come eighteen times and entrusted her with messages calling people to prayer and penance. Today Lourdes has become a place of pilgrimage and healing, both in body and soul. It is also the World Day of Prayer for the Sick. At 10am Mass, the Sacrament of the Sick, will be offered to anyone who would wish to receive it.

The Motherwell Diocesan Communications Team have been working to produce a new monthly Diocesan Magazine which will launch next month with the first edition available from Ash Wednesday, 22<sup>nd</sup> February. The magazine will be available on the last weekend of every month and will contain news and events from around the Diocese, including parishes and schools, as well as articles on various faith and diocesan topics.

#### PARISH FINANCES

May I thank you, most sincerely, for your generosity to the recent Christmas Collection: over the period of a fortnight (Christmas Day and New Year's Day) it amounted to approximately £10,000! This is a great testimony to your support for your parish. God reward you!

We have recently paid £3224.59 - an instalment of the annual Diocesan Levy which was apparently unpaid in the first half of last year. I will pay next week the annual interest on the loan that was taken out several years ago to repair the roof - the Diocese have told me that it is £4889.56 - this is about £1000 less than it was last year.

In common with some Parishes, we have still not received a gas bill from British Gas for the past two months for the Church, Hall and Chapel House. From what I know of other Parishes, where bills have been received, this sum will be around £5000 for two months! A truly eyewatering sum!

#### FROM SAINT ANDREW'S AND SAINT BRIDE'S HIGH SCHOOL

A Family Faith learning workshop at Saint Andrew's and Saint Bride's High School will take place on the 31<sup>st</sup> January 2023. It is aimed at S1-S3 pupils and parents, from 6-7pm in our school Oratory. Bishop Toal continues to make good progress after his surgery on the 6<sup>th</sup> of January. He is convalescing with his family in the north of Scotland. He hopes to be back in the Diocese mid-February. Our Lady, Health of the Sick, pray for him.

#### **CALENDAR**



Tuesday is the memorial of Saint Francis De Sales, the Reformation Bishop of Geneva, who could not be installed in his Cathedral because the city was a Protestant stronghold. He was Saint Janes Frances de Chantal's spiritual director, and with her founded the Visitation Order. Francis is the author of the Introduction to the Devout Life - an everyday spirituality for busy people living in the world. He famously wrote, "A spoonful of honey does more good than a barrelful of vinegar", that is to say, kindness does more good than bitterness and resentment. Saint Francis died at Lyons in 1622.

Wednesday is the Feast of the Conversion of Saint Paul on the road to Damascus in modern-day Syria. It allowed him to become the greatest missionary of the Christian Faith and the Apostle to the Gentiles.

On Thursday we remember Saint Timothy and Saint Titus. Timothy was born in the Roman province of Galatia, in modern-day Turkey. After his baptism he became Saint Paul's companion on his second missionary journey in the decade of the 50s AD. Paul appointed him bishop of Ephesus. Titus, a convert from paganism, was a fellow-labourer with Saint Paul. He appointed him bishop of Crete (the largest of the Greek islands) - a difficult charge because of the character of his inhabitants!

**Friday** is the memorial of **Saint Angela Merici**. Born in northern Italy, she founded the Ursuline Order, the first teaching order for women approved by the Church.

The Dominican priest, **Saint Thomas Aquinas**, is remembered on **Saturday**. Born near Rome, in 1225, he left home - much to his father's annoyance - in his early twenties to study in Cologne under Saint Albert the Great. He was ordained to the Priesthood and would spend the rest of his life teaching philosophy and theology - he considered one of the greatest Christian thinkers. Thomas wrote the Eucharistic hymns: *O salutaris Hostia*, *Tantum ergo* and *Panis Angelicus*. He died in 1274.
