

SAINT JOHN NEUMANN, BISHOP OF PHILADELPHIA

At the end of this week, we honour three saints who are associated with North America: on Thursday, we remember Saint Elizabeth Anne Seaton, foundress of the parochial school system in the USA; on Saturday, Saint André Bessette, the apostle of devotion to Saint



Joseph in Montreal, Canada, and on Friday, the young Bishop of Philadelphia, Saint John Neumann, who died at forty-eight.

John Neumann was born in 1811 in Budweiser, Bohemia, which is now part of the Czech Republic. By the time he was twenty-four, he had learned six languages and had completed his studies for the priesthood. He was not ordained, however, because his bishop thought there were too many priests in his country, and he advised him to find a job in the country's Diplomatic Service because of his linguistic skills. John, however, decided to leave for America, hoping to be ordained there. He said goodbye to his parents and brother and sailed from Le Havre in France for the United States. When he arrived, he had one suit of clothes and one dollar in his pocket. Three weeks later, the bishop of New York, the famous John Dubois, ordained him.

John's first task was among the German-speaking Catholics in mission parishes near Buffalo, upstate New York. Priests at

that time travelled on horseback and went long distances to care for people in neighbouring towns and villages. People laughed at the clumsy way Father John rode his horse - because he was short, his feet did not reach the stirrups; even children made fun of him. John remained silent, and continued his ministry, teaching Catechism, visiting the sick, and training teachers.

Father John felt drawn to community life and joined the Redemptorist Order: he was the first Redemptorist to make perpetual vows in the United States, and later became the superior of the American branch of the Order. When he was forty-one years old, Pope Pius IX named him the fourth bishop of Philadelphia. Still, some people did not welcome him: they did not care for his accent and his plain style of speaking. Besides these people, John had to deal with a strong anti-Catholic group that was burning convents and schools in the city. He felt incapable of doing his job, and asked to be sent to a smaller diocese, but he was told by the Pope to stay.

John began Catholic schools in his diocese, since he believed it was very important for children to be educated and taught the ways of the faith. In eight years, Philadelphia's two Catholic schools grew to more than one hundred schools. John brought many teaching Orders to his diocese. One of the highlights of John Neumann's life was his participation, in Rome, in the proclamation of the Dogma of the Immaculate Conception by Pius IX in 1854. Through his efforts, the *Quarante Ore*, the 'Forty Hours' Devotion to the Blessed Sacrament was introduced in Philadelphia. He founded the first parish in the United States for Italian-speaking people.

During a snowstorm, on the 5th January, John Neumann died of a heart attack while walking back to the Cathedral - he had been visiting the sick. Throughout his life, he went about his work quietly and humbly, no special honours were ever given him; he was even unpopular at times. Only after his death did people begin to talk about their humble, good bishop who worked so hard for God. He was canonised by Pope Paul VI in 1977. **Father McGachey**

CALENDAR

On Tuesday we remember Saints Basil the Great (+379) and Gregory Nazianzen (+389). Basil was born into a Christian family in Caesarea, Turkey. He lived as a monk for several years and would write a Monastic Rule, still followed today in the Eastern Church. He vigorously fought the Arian heresy (the belief that Jesus is not divine) and became Bishop of Caesarea. Saint Gregory was also from Cappadocia in Turkey. A friend of Basil, he was ordained to the priesthood, and in 381 became Bishop of Constantinople.

Thursday is the memorial of Saint Elizabeth Ann Bayley Seaton. Born in New York City in the late 1700s and raised as an Episcopalian. She married the shipping magnate, William Seton, with whom she had five children. The loss of their fortune so affected William's health, that in 1803, they went to stay with friends at Livorno, Italy. William died six weeks after their arrival, and when Elizabeth returned to New York six months later, she was already a convinced Catholic. Abandoned by her relatives, Elizabeth was invited to found a school for girls in Baltimore, and so laid the foundations for the American parochial school system. Seaton was canonised by Pope Paul VI in 1975.

Saturday is the memorial of Saint André Bessette (+1937). Born near Quebec, he entered the Congregation of the Holy Cross as a brother. He performed humble tasks around the monastery for over forty years and entrusted all those who flocked to his cell to the care of Saint Joseph. During his lifetime, he was able to have a chapel built in honour of the Saint. After his death, the shrine grew into Saint Joseph's Basilica famous in Montreal.
