WHAT BERNADETTE SAW AT LOURDES...

Saturday of this week is the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes. In 1858, Our Lady appeared to Bernadette Soubirous eighteen times in the outskirts of the town Lourdes in the French Pyrenees. Here, in Saint Bernadette's own words, is an account of what happened.



I had gone down one day with two other girls to the bank of the river Gave when suddenly I heard a kind of rustling sound. I turned my head toward the field by the side of the river but the trees seemed quite still and the noise was evidently not from them. Then I looked up and caught sight of the cave where I saw a lady wearing a white dress with a bright belt. On top of each of her feet was a pale-yellow rose, the same colour as her rosary beads.


At this I rubbed my eyes, thinking I was seeing things, and I put my hands into the fold of my dress where my rosary was. I wanted to make the sign of the cross but for the life of me I couldn't manage it and my hand just fell down. Then the lady made the sign of the cross herself, and at the second attempt, I managed to do the

same, though my hands were trembling. Then I began to say the rosary while the lady let her beads slip through her fingers, without moving her lips. When I stopped saying the 'Hail Mary', she immediately vanished.

I asked my two companions if they had noticed anything, but they said no. Of course, they wanted to know what I was doing, and I told them that I had seen a lady, wearing a white dress, though I didn't know who she was. I told them not to say anything about it, and they said I was silly to have anything to do with it. I said they were wrong and I came back next Sunday, feeling myself drawn to the place....

The third time I went the lady spoke to me and asked me to come every day for fifteen days. I said I would and then she said that she wanted me to tell the priests to build a chapel there. She also told me to drink from the stream. I went to the Gave, the only stream I could see. Then she made me realise she was not speaking of the Gave and she indicated a little trickle of water close by. When I got to it I could only find a few drops, mostly mud. I cupped my hands to catch some liquid without success and then I started to scrape the ground. I managed to find a few drops of water but only at the fourth attempt was there a sufficient amount for any kind of drink. The lady then vanished, and I went back home.

I went back each day for two weeks and each time, except one Monday and one Friday, the lady appeared and told me to look for a stream and wash in it and to see that the priests build a chapel there. I must also pray, she said, for the conversion of sinners. I asked her many times what she meant by that, but she only smiled. Finally with outstretched arms and eyes looking up to heaven she told me she was the Immaculate Conception. During the two weeks she told me three secrets but I was not to speak about them to anyone and so far I have not. *From a Letter of Saint Bernadette Soubirous*



TODAY - THE BLESSING OF CANDLES AND THE SAINT BLAISE BLESSING OF THROATS

On this, the Sunday nearest the Feast of the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple - which fell on Thursday of last week - we will bless candles for use in the home at the beginning of each Mass.

It is worth remembering that every Roman Catholic home should have at least two blessed candles to be used when: Holy Communion is brought to someone in the house; at times of prayer or to burn before a holy picture or statue (this custom says that although I cannot be there in prayer all day, my intention is to be there in spirit - this is the same reason we light votive candles in the church); at a time of danger or special need, and at the time of death.

The candles are modestly priced and can be purchased at the end of each Mass - there are price stickers beside each candle. Please put any

monies in the wooden box.

On Friday we remembered Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, who, for many centuries has been the patron Saint of those with ailments of the throat. I will offer the traditional Blessing of Saint Blaise after all the Masses this weekend, at the end of the final hymn. There is no obligation to receive it, so if you wish, you may leave the Church.

It is also the World Day of Prayer for the Sick.

At 10am Mass, the Sacrament of the Sick, will be offered to anyone who would wish to receive it.

On Monday we honour Saint Paul Miki, a Japanese Jesuit, and his twenty-five companions who were martyred in Nagasaki. They were killed simultaneously by being raised on crosses and then stabbed with spears. Their executioners were astounded upon seeing their joy at being associated to the Passion of Christ. They were the first martyrs of East Asia to be canonised.

Wednesday is the memorial of Saint Josephine Bahkita (pictured). As a young Sudanese girl she was sold into slavery and brought to Italy where, while working as a nanny, she was sent to live with the Canossian Sisters in Venice. There sshe served

humbly for the next twenty five years. Josephine died after a long illness, during which she would cry out to the Lord: "Please loosen the chains... they are so heavy!"

Saint Scholastica (+547) is remembered on Friday. She was the twin sister of St. Benedict. born in Umbria about 480. Under Benedict's direction, Scholastica founded a community of nuns near Monte Cassino. She devoted her whole life to seeking and serving God. Saturday is the Feast of Our Lady of Lourdes - see the front cover of the bulletin.

The wooden plinth that the Tabernacle sits on was badly damaged some time ago by water ingress to the Church. Not only does it look unattractive, or sympathetic with its surroundings, but I feel the Blessed Sacrament merits something more worthy. This week, work will begin to construct a new 'high altar' structure, which will give the Tabernacle more prominence and will be sympathetic with the other furnishings. In a sense this project will be restoring the Church to how it once looked. A parishioner has kindly offered to pay for this work to be carried out. As a result, this may mean that the Tabernacle will be moved, temporarily, to Our Lady's altar to allow the work to be done.

I feel that it would be fitting to place on top of the new 'high altar' the customary six candlesticks: these will honour the Lord's Real Presence and provide a fitting backdrop for that area of the Church. To do this, I would like ask for your help, and appeal for any donations, great or small. These will be gratefully received.
