Bulletin for the Solemnity of the Transfiguration of Our Lord on Mount Tabor - 6th August 2023

OUR LADY OF THE SNOWS

Yesterday, the 5th August, the Church celebrated the feast day not of a saint, but of a building - the Basilica of Saint Mary Major, one of the four most illustrious churches of Rome (the other three being: Saint John Lateran [the Pope's Cathedral in the Eternal City], St. Peter's at the Vatican [the spot where Saint Peter was martyred], and Saint Paul Outside the Walls [marking the place where Saint Paul was killed for the faith]). *Santa Maria Maggiore*, as the Basilica is known in Italian, is the most important church in the world dedicated to Our Lady; it is the biggest church in Rome which honours Our Lady, hence the reason it is called 'Maggiore' meaning 'greatest' or 'biggest'.



Even today, the Basilica is sometimes known as the Liberian Basilica, in honour of Pope Liberius (352-66AD). According to a pious legend, which probably dates from the Middle Ages, Our Lady appeared in a dream to two Roman Christians, the married couple John and Placida, who wealthy members of Rome's were Patrician or upper class. She is said to have asked them to build church in her honour on the Esquiline hill (one of the 'seven hills Rome'). The location would of be indicated, she had said, by a fall of snow on the night of 4th-5th of August. They told

Pope Liberius about the dream, and he is said to have traced the outline of the building in the snow, and the first basilica was built on that site. For this reason, the basilica is sometimes called *Our Lady of the Snows* (*Sancta Maria ad nives*, in Latin); something which is further underlined by the fall of white rose petals rom the ceiling of the basilica which takes place this evening at the end of Vespers or Evening Prayer.

Leaving the pious legend aside, history tells us that Pope Liberius was a firm crusader against the *Arian* heresy, which denied that Jesus was truly divine. We know that during Liberius' Pontificate the Esquiline Hill had been settled by barbarian troops who were largely Arian sympathisers. By building a church there in honour of Our Lady, Liberius perhaps wanted to underline divinity of Jesus, and that Mary was his mother.

Pope Liberius' basilica fell into ruin and almost disappeared. The present-day basilica replaced the original structure when Pope Sixtus III (432-40AD) decided to build a new and more magnificent one. In many ways Sixtus wanted to underline Mary's title as 'the Mother of God', which had been given her by the Council of Ephesus (in modern-day north western Turkey), which took place in 431AD. The title itself rejects Arianism by implying that Jesus was truly divine as the Son of God, and truly human as the Son of Mary. Sixtus decorated the walls of the basilica with mosaics from the lives of Christ and Mary - these survive to this day.

From earliest times the basilica claimed to have a precious wooden relic, believed to be part of the crib in which Our Lord was placed at Bethlehem. Sixtus reproduced the grotto of Bethlehem - this was adorned and enriched over the centuries. The wooden relic is encased in a reliquary under the main altar and can be visited today. It is for these reasons that the basilica became known as the *Basilica of Saint Mary of the Crib (Sancta Maria ad praesepe)*, a kind of Bethlehem in the Eternal City. For centuries the Popes celebrated the first Mass of Christmas there.

The basilica is visited by over a million people each year, including his Holiness Pope Francis, who visits to pray before the icon of Our Lady that hangs in of one of the side chapels, the Borghese Chapel - *Maria, Salus Populi Romani* (Mary, health of the Roman People), before he begins one of his Apostolic journeys around the world (he did this last week before travelling to Lisbon where he is until this evening); he also visits on the way back, and leaves a bouquet of flowers in thanksgiving. *Father McGachey*

TODAY IS THE FEAST OF THE TRANSFIGURATION OF OUR LORD

The Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord became popular in the Western Church at the beginning of the eleventh century and was introduced into the Roman Calendar in 1457. It foretells the glory of Jesus as God Son, seen in his Resurrection and Ascension into heaven. For you and me, it anticipates the glory of heaven, where we shall see God face to face.

THE NATIONAL PILGRIMAGE TO CARFIN 2023 SUNDAY 3rd SEPTEMBER - PRAYING IN SOLIDARITY WITH UKRAINE

All are welcome to join the Archbishops and Bishops of Scotland in praying for this important intention. Holy Mass will be celebrated by Bishop Hugh Gilbert OSB, Bishop of Aberdeen. The homily will be given by Bishop Kenneth Nowakowski, Ukrainian Eparchial Bishop of the Holy Family Eparchy in London.

CALENDAR

Monday is memorial of Pope Saint Sixtus II and his deacons (+258), who were the first victims of the persecution unleashed by the Emperor Valerian. **Tuesday** is the memorial of the Spaniard **Saint Dominic** (+1221). He combated the Albigensian heresy. He founded the Order of Preachers (Dominicans) - he required his friars to work with their minds by preaching and teaching.

Saint Edith Stein is remembered on Wednesday (+1942). Born of Jewish parents in 1891, she became an influential philosopher following her university studies. After her conversion to Catholicism, she entered the Carmelites in 1933, and took the name Sister Teresa Benedicta. She was arrested by the Nazis in 1942, along other Catholics of Jewish extraction and transported by train to Auschwitz, where she died in the gas chambers. Thursday is the Feast of Saint Lawrence (+258) chief among the seven deacons who served the Roman Church during the mid-third century. He was responsible for caring for the goods of the Church and distributing its alms among the poor. He was arrested by the Emperor Valerian, laid upon a gridiron and slowly roasted to death.

Friday is the memorial **Saint Clare of Assisi** (+1253). She was the first female to practice the life of poverty as taught by Saint Francis. Placed by him at the head of a few companions in the small convent of San Damiano, she governed her community for forty-two years thus founding the Order of Poor Clares.
