A LETTER FROM FATHER McGACHEY

Dear Parishioners,

If there were three days when Roman Catholics should want to go to Church to pray, they are: Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

They celebrate the most sacred mysteries of our faith: the life, death and resurrection of Our Lord - the most important days in the Church's Calendar.

Please make it a priority to go to Church to celebrate these three days this year. Reserve the time! Rearrange your schedule if necessary! Suspend errands or jobs around the house! Drop everything! And come to Church!

Plan to attend the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, to honour, the Holy Eucharist which was instituted at the Last Supper. And to pray for your Priests, who pray for you, God's Holy People, five times every day, and who despite their limitations and weaknesses, try to serve you as best they can. This is a beautiful Mass - make the effort to be there!

On Good Friday, to Commemorate the Passion and Death of Our Lord.

On Holy Saturday, for the **Great Easter Vigil**, celebrating the resurrection, when Christ conquered Death with Life.

Enter the mystery of these three Holy Days at Saint Bride's


PALM SUNDAY - DOMINICA IN PALMIS

Today is Palm Sunday (*Dominica in Palmis*) and the beginning of Holy Week. This Sunday is synonymous with the blessing and carrying in procession of palm branches in imitation of those carried by the Hebrew people who welcomed Christ into Jerusalem.

In the ancient world palm branches were a sign of peace and victory; they were carried by Romans and Greeks in their great state processions, and often used as adornments.

In the Holy Land, as in most parts of the Middle East, the type of palm tree that grows is called in Latin *Phoenix Dactylifera*, better known to us today as the Date Palm, from which succulent dates are harvested. These trees apparently grow to heights of eighty feet, although forty feet is more common, and they yield dates suitable for eating six years after they have been planted; they continue to produce fruit for around one hundred years. Its trunk is straight, tall and unbroken, terminating in a crown of fronds.

As its Latin name indicates, palms were associated with the mythical bird, the Phoenix, because it was thought that the bird would land on the fronds of this majestic tree, then combust in flames, and from the ashes of the old bird a new bird would rise through a kind of regeneration. For obvious reasons the early Christians came to associate the *Phoenix Dactylifera* with Christ, who from rose from death to new life. *Dactylifera* simply means 'date bearing'.



Many familiar Biblical places have a connection with palm trees: Jericho, for example, was known as the "city of palm trees". Bethany, where Martha, Mary and Lazarus lived, means the "house of dates". Phoenicia, mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles, is in all probability derived from the Greek word for palm. In the Book of Psalms, Psalm 92, the familiar comparison İS made:

righteous shall flourish like the palm tree." In the Book of Revelation, the saints are described in heaven as: "clothed with white robes and with palms in their hands." Palms became symbol of martyrdom in the early Church.

Blessed palms are sacramentals. According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church, sacramentals are: "sacred signs which bear a resemblance to the sacraments. They signify effects, particularly of a spiritual nature, which are obtained through the intercession of the Church." Other sacramentals include relics, holy oils, holy water, a rosary etc. They should therefore be treated with respect and given a place of honour in our homes. Father McGachey


CAN YOU HELP, PLEASE ...?

We are lucky not to have a weekly second collection. This is not the case in many other parishes. Therefore, this the only time, apart from Christmas, when we ask for a little extra help. Please give what you can afford. Thank you very much!

GIFT AID



We are almost at the end of the Financial Year, and those of you who use collection envelopes have just about finished your booklets. New envelopes will be delivered to your homes over the next few weeks.

There are lots of people coming to Mass at the weekend at Saint Bride's. And when I empty the collection bags on a Sunday, there are lots of high value notes. I often wonder to myself: how many of these contributions could be Giftaided? I would encourage you to think seriously about joining the Giftaid Scheme - particularly our younger parishioners. It costs you absolutely nothing - the only qualification is that you pay Income Tax. I think, too, that some of you may believe that you are already signed-up to the Giftaid scheme, and in reality you are not. Please check with me if you are in doubt.

This is a very important source of income for the parish, since for every pound you contribute to the collection, we can claim 25p from the Government. Money for nothing! Last year we earned almost £21,000 from your contributions. With so much work to be done around the Church and Presbytery, this will help us face these tasks with more confidence.



GOOD FRIDAY WALK - THE WAY OF THE CROSS

Join the Legion of Mary on Good Friday morning, as we walk, visiting all four Catholic Churches in East Kilbride. Throughout the walk we will pray the mysteries of the Rosary, also spending time walking in silent prayer. We stop at each of the churches to pray the Stations of the Cross. The walk begins at St Vincent de Paul's Church at 9am, followed by Our Lady of Lourdes, St Bride's, and finishing the walk at St Leonard's church around Midday. Please come and jgin us by walking all or part of the way. Draw close to Jesus in this beautiful prayerful Good Friday walk.

SAINT CYRIL OF JERUSALEM AND THE GREAT WEEK

Sandwiched between the feasts of Saint Patrick and Saint Joseph, on the 18th of March, is the memorial of a saint who deserves to be better known, and to whom we owe a great deal: Saint Cyril of Jerusalem.



Little is known of his early life, save that he was born in Jerusalem around 315, and that his parents, who were Christian and wealthy, provided him with a good education. Ordained by Bishop Maximus, he was given the responsibility of preparing catechumens for Baptism: eighteen of his pre-baptismal discourses (*catecheses*), and five post-baptismal discourses (*mystagogia*), survive; they provide us with a snapshot of the theology and ritual of the time.

When Cyril was growing up, Jerusalem was not considered an important diocese. This changed when the emperor Constantine legalised Christianity in 313, and particularly when his mother, Helen, visited the Holy Land and began building the Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre over the place

where Jesus had been crucified and buried. In 350 Cyril was appointed bishop of Jerusalem and led efforts to make it a place of pilgrimage, keen to underline the fact that most momentous events of our salvation happened there.

As we approach Easter, it is good to remember that it was likely Cyril who devised the liturgical framework that we still use during Holy Week, or the "Great Week" as he called it, for visiting pilgrims. We have a good window on these thanks to the *Itinerarium* or travelogue of Egeria, a Spanish woman, who made the pilgrimage in the early 380s. She describes, not only how the days of the Great Week were lived out, but the beauty of the Basilica where these liturgies took place. It is well worth reading if you get a chance!

The Great Week, she says, began with a triumphal procession, with branches of palm and olive carried by the faithful from Bethany to the Basilica, amid chants and hymns. The three days that followed were a time for contemplation of the events chronicled in the Gospels leading up to Jesus' arrest - we still listen to the same Gospels today.

On Holy Thursday, after a solemn Eucharist commemorating the Last Supper, the faithful would go to the Mount of Olives to spend the night in prayer - remembering Christ's agony in the garden. After an early start on Good Friday, and the Evangelists' accounts of the Passion having been read, the True Cross, discovered by Helena, was displayed, and the faithful, barefooted, come forward to venerate it. On Holy Saturday night, the Basilica, festooned with oil lamps, and arrayed in its finest furnishings, hosted the Easter Vigil, with its various parts: of Light, of the Word, of Baptism and the Eucharist. This service was celebrated with much solemnity and rejoicing throughout the entire night.

The pilgrims, on returning home, brought Cyril's liturgies back with them, and those services, rich in ritual and symbolism, served as models for our Holy Week worship today. With the Great Week just a few weeks away, as we accompany the Lord through the events or our salvation, let's take time to give thanks for Cyril, and the rich seam of worship that he has left us!
