



THE CHRISTMAS TREE

It is sometimes said that the Christmas Tree is a pagan Winter tradition which has got mixed-up with the Christian celebration of Christ's birth. However, the story of its origin is a good deal more interesting than that.

It is true that the Northern pagans of Europe held evergreens in special awe, as preservers of life in the dead time of the year. But as early as the Eleventh century, a fir or other evergreen, hung with apples, was a standard part of the so-called 'Christmas Mystery Plays'. Called the 'Paradise Tree', it represented the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil which led to the Fall of Adam and Eve, as recounted in the Book of Genesis. It was carried in procession by the actor who played Adam and then remained in full view throughout the Mystery Play, and thus took on in time, a new meaning, as a symbol of Christmas itself. As late as the Nineteenth century, little figures of Adam and Eve were placed below the illuminated tree in some German households.



Over the centuries, the tree became one form of the 'Christmas light' which people put in their windows throughout Christmas Season. In recent decades in the UK, the Nordic custom of placing a pyramid of candles has become popular - this Nordic tradition comes from the Medieval custom of the Paradise Tree.

The first record of a domestic decorated tree, as we know it, was noted by a visitor to Strasbourg in 1605. It remained very much a German and Austrian tradition until the Nineteenth century, though evergreens, like holly and mistletoe, were everywhere used in homes and Churches, where they frequently remained until the Feast of Our Lord's Presentation in the Temple, sometimes called 'Candlemas Day', on the 2nd of February - the fortieth day after Christmas.

People who read Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol' nowadays are sometime puzzled at the absence of Christmas trees from the various scenes of seasonal jollity. But the tradition only began to make headway in Britain

after the young Queen Victoria married Prince Albert and German customs came into vogue.

So the Christmas tree has a long and honourable Christian tradition, and can indeed be seen as symbolic of Christ himself, the tree of life and the light of the world, "the Light no darkness can overtake." (Gospel according to John). Father McGachey

Next Sunday is the Solemnity of the Epiphany of our Lord.

There will be a retiring Collection to support to the Justice and Peace Commission of the Bishops' Conference of Scotland.

CALENDAR

Tuesday is the memorial of Saint Sylvester I (+335). One of the longest reigning popes in the history of the Church, he served during the time of the great Councils, including Nicea, which clarified our belief in the divinity of Christ. Wednesday -Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God - we honour Mary's motherhood, her role and title as Dei Genetrix (Latin) and Theotokos (Greek)- the Bearer or Moher of God. On Thursday we remember Saints Basil the Great (+379) and Gregory Nazianzen (+389). Basil was a brilliant student, born to a Christian family in Cappadocia (Turkey). For some years, he followed the monastic way of life but fought the Arian heresy - that denied the divinity of Christ. He became Bishop of Caesarea in 370. The monks of the Eastern Church today still follow the monastic rules which he set down. Gregory was also from Cappadocia. A friend of Basil, he too followed the monastic way of life for some years. He was ordained priest and became Bishop of Constantinople, during the period when the Arian heresy was at its height. He was called 'The Theologian' because of his great learning. Friday is the feast of the Most Holy Name of Jesus. The name of Jesus means Saviour; it had been shown in a dream to Saint Joseph, together with its meaning, and to Our Lady at the Annunciation by the angel Gabriel. Devotion to the Holy Name is deeply rooted in the Bible, and was promoted by Saint Bernard and Saint Bernardine of Siena in the Middle Ages. The month of January has traditionally been dedicated to the Holy Name. Saturday is the memorial of Saint Elizabeth Ann Bayley Seaton. Born in New York City in the late 1700s, she was brought up as an Episcopalian. She married William Seton, with whom she had five children. The loss of their fortune so affected William's health that, in 1803, Elizabeth and William went to stay with Catholic friends at Livorno, Italy. William died six weeks after their arrival, and when Elizabeth returned to New York some six months later, she was already a convinced Catholic. She met with opposition from her Episcopalian friends but was received into full communion with the Catholic Church. Abandoned by her family, Elizabeth was invited by the Superior of the Sulpician Order in Baltimore to found a school for girls in that city. She laid the foundation for the American parochial school system, training teachers and preparing textbooks. She also opened orphanages in Philadelphia and New York City. She was canonised by Pope Paul VI in 1975.
