Bulletin for the Thirtieth Sunday of the Ordinary Season - 3rd November 2024

BLESSED JOHN DUNS SCOTUS

Most of us will have heard of the parish of Blessed John Duns Scotus in the Gorbals area of Glasgow. It is looked after by the Franciscan Order and is well-known for the Novena to Saint Anthony of Padua which is held there every week. But who was Blessed John Duns Scotus? His feast occurs on the 8th November, Thursday of this week, and although not yet declared a Saint, he has been beatified (the stage before Sainthood), hence the reason he is called 'Blessed'. What do we know about this famous Scot who was held in high esteem across the length and breadth of Europe in his own lifetime?

Born at Duns, near Berwick, in the Borders in 1265, John came from well-off farming family. Later in life, he was identified as 'Duns Scotus' to indicate the place and land of his birth; *Scotia* is the Latin word for Scotland.



According to tradition, John struggled at school - learning did not come easily to him. One day, on his way home after school, he visited the local parish church. In frustration, he burst into tears, before a large wooden statue of Our Lady. When he calmed down, he said to Our Lady, "Mary, help me in my studies. If you do, I promise that I will speak well of you, O Mother of God." Within a few weeks, John's academic life at school had turned around - as his thirst for learning grew, so too did his intellect.

John was clothed with the Franciscans habit at Dumfries, where his uncle Elias was the Superior of the community. He went on to study at Oxford and was ordained to the

Priesthood in 1291 in the parish of Saint Andrew's, Northampton, which in those days was in the Diocese of Lincoln.

He was sent to study in Paris until 1297, when he returned to lecture at Oxford and Cambridge Universities. Four years later, he went back to Paris to teach and complete his doctorate.

Perhaps his most famous intervention in the theological world took place in Paris, when he was invited to defend Our Lady's Immaculate Conception (that Mary was conceived in the womb of her mother, Saint Anne, without any stain of Original Sin) in a major debate. At the time, there was a great deal of argument about the subject. The general opinion was that it was "appropriately respectful" to the Mother of God to believe that she was Immaculately Conceived, but it could not be seen *how* to explain and resolve the problem adequately from a theological point of view.

While the Church had celebrated the feast of the Immaculate Conception as early as the 5th century, the idea met with opposition on the part of medieval philosophers and theologians, including people like Saint Bernard of Clairvaux and Saint Thomas Aquinas. Scotus proposed a solution: he argued for Mary's Immaculate Conception by saying that it was the result of a "more perfect redemption by Christ because of her special role in the history of our salvation". At the end of his argument, he quoted the famous principle of the monk, Saint Anselm of Canterbury: "potuit, decuit, ergo fecit" (God could do it, it was

appropriate, therefore he did it). Scotus' argument appeared in Pope Pius IX's 1854 declaration of the Dogma of the Immaculate Conception, "at the first moment of her conception, Mary was preserved free from the stain of original sin, in view of the merits of Jesus Christ."

In 1308, his Order sent him to teach in the Franciscan house of studies at Cologne and he died there the following year. The epitaph on his tomb in Cologne famously reads, 'Scotia me genuit, Anglia me suscepit, Gallia me docuit, Colonia me tenet' (Scotland begot me, England took me in, France taught me, Cologne holds me). He was beatified by Pope Saint John Paul II in 1993. The most famous Scot of the Middle Age, who deserves to be a Saint for having 'spoken well' of Our Lady. Father McGachey
