
THE DAY FOR LEAVING ASIDE THE ALBS...

f you happened to see anything of the Easter Vigil from Saint Peter's at the Vatican last Saturday evening, you would have noticed how the eight adults, who had been baptised by Pope Francis, were clothed in a white cloak-type robe before they received the Sacrament of Confirmation.

This custom is, in fact, a nod to a tradition of the Church from the fourth century. In those times, today, the Sunday after Easter, was known as 'Dominica in albis deponendis' that is to say, 'the day for leaving to the side the albs'.

In fourth century in Rome, baptisms usually happened only once a year - on the night before Easter Sunday, during the Great Easter Vigil. Those to be baptised, usually only adults, would be clothed in a white garment, called an alb, like the long white robe which the priest wears underneath his chasuble (the coloured outer garment) at Mass.

Those who were to be baptised, would descend three steps - in memory of the three days Christ spent in the tomb - into a large pool of water, properly called the *baptistery*. This was located in the Lateran Basilica, the public building, gifted to the Church by the Emperor Constantine, after he gave Christians freedom to leave the cemeteries of the city, the catacombs, and worship publicly.



They were baptised by total immersion in the water. Then they would climb three steps at the other side of the pool, in memory of the Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, whose lives they

now shared. They wore their baptismal albs for eight days to remind themselves and other people that they "had been clothed with Christ" and had taken on a new identity, that of a Christian. On the Sunday after Easter, they would lay aside these albs.

When infants are baptised today, they usually come dressed in white, and during the baptismal liturgy are wrapped in a christening shawl. The christening shawl conveys the idea of the white robe of the Early Church.

Today, the Second Sunday of Easter, is the conclusion of the Easter Octave - the eight days of solemn celebration of Our Lord's resurrection from the dead. The idea of an 'octave' or 'eight days' is an interesting one, based on Biblical symbolism: in the Bible, seven is a perfect number, but seven plus one represents ultimate perfection, God himself. In the present liturgical calendar, there are two Octaves, that of Easter and the other of Christmas - the two principal feasts of the Christian year.

This Sunday was also known as 'Quasimodo Sunday'. The name Quasimodo comes from the Latin text of the Introit Antiphon for the beginning of Mass today, which begins "Quasimodo geniti infantes...". It comes from the First Letter of Peter 2,1, roughly translated as "As new-born babes...". Literally, *quasimodo* means "as if in [this] manner".



In Victor Hugo's novel *The Hunchback of Notre Dame*, the main character *Quasimodo* is so-called because he was born on Quasimodo Sunday (the Sunday after Easter). Abandoned on the steps of Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris, he was raised in its precincts by the Dean, he would go on to become a bell ringer there.

Today is also known as 'Low Sunday' the reason for this being that the liturgy of the Second Sunday of Easter

contrasts with that of the Easter Sunday, as a day when a lower level of ceremonial is used.

Finally, today is Divine Mercy Sunday, instituted by Pope Saint John Paul II in 2000. It focuses on the merciful love of God's Son, and the desire to let that love flow through one's own heart to those around us. The devotion came about thanks to the apparitions of Christ received by the Polish Saint, Faustina Kowalska (1905-1938). Father McGachey
