OUR LADY OF GUADALUPE AND SAINT JUAN DIEGO



This week, the Church's Calendar lays before us three feast days of Our Lady: on Monday, transferred from today, the Immaculate Conception; on Tuesday Our Lady of Loreto and on Thursday, Our Lady of Guadalupe.

In the winter of 1531, a poor, 57-year-old Aztec Indian, living five miles outside of Mexico City, encountered a miraculous happening on his way to morning Mass. Firstly, he heard music coming from Tepeyac Hill, and then he heard a woman's voice calling his name. Juan Diego climbed the hill and found a young woman - she was like his own people in physical appearance and dress. The woman identified herself as the Virgin Mary and told Juan Diego to ask the bishop of Mexico City to build a church on the hill, which would be a source of help in the conversion of the Mexican people, and a fount of consolation for the Mexican people.

Juan Diego obeyed the request, but the bishop was sceptical about the message, even though he could see that Juan was

a humble man and a well-meaning Catholic. Juan reported the bishop's doubt to the Lady at Tepeyac, and she asked him to return to the bishop once again, with the same message. The bishop once again listened to what Juan Diego had to say, but this time told him to ask the Lady for a sign that would prove that she was the Mother of God.

When he returned to Tepeyac, the Lady gave Juan Diego such a sign. Miraculously, roses appeared on the hill in the middle of winter, and Juan Diego gathered them in his *tilma* or cloak. The Lady arranged the roses with her own hands, and Juan returned to the bishop's residence. When Juan Diego laid open the *tilma*, the flowers fell to the ground, and an image of the Lady, heavily pregnant, with a blue sash abound her waist (a way of indicating that the woman was *enceinte* or expecting a child) was seen on the inside of his *tilma* (see the image above).

The bishop immediately fell to his knees, and believed Juan Diego. A church was built on the spot of the apparition, as Mary had requested. Eight million people converted to Catholicism in a short period of time upon hearing of Juan Diego's account or viewing the miraculous image of Our Lady on his *tilma*.

Juan Diego's *tilma* has been the subject of exhaustive modern research. Woven out of coarse cactus fibre, it should have disintegrated after twenty years, and although more than five hundred years have passed, the *tilma* is still in perfect condition.

The pupils of Our Lady's eyes reflect the Indians and clergy who were present at the time of the first apparition. No paint was used, and chemical analysis has not been able to identify the source of the colours. Moreover, studies have revealed that the stars on Our Lady's blue cloak, match their position in the sky above Guadalupe in December 1531. The *tilma* is displayed above the high altar in the Basilica at Guadalupe today, and the shrine there is visited each year by million pilgrims. It is seen to because of Our Lady's heavily

pregnant state, as a place to pray for the protection and promotion of human life, from the point of conception.

Our Lady spoke the following words to Juan Diego during the first apparition - they are full of comfort and reassurance: "Hear me and understand well, my son, that nothing should frighten or grieve you. Let not your heart be disturbed. Do not fear sickness, or any other anguish. Am I not here? I am not your Mother? Are you not under my protection? What else do you wish? Do not grieve, or be disturbed by anything." Father McGachey



MONDAY OF THIS WEEK IS THE SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

We will have a concelebrated Festal Mass, with organ and incense, on Monday at 10am, as we remember how Our Lady was conceived without stain of original sin in the womb of her mother, Saint Anne. Please join us if you can. There will be Exposition at 9.15am until 9.50am. The Rosary will not be recited publicly this morning.

In the evening at 7pm we will have Devotions in honour of Our Lady for the Feast, beginning with a *Lucernarium* (a Thanksgiving for Light) at Our Lady's altar, a torchlight procession, the recitation of the Rosary and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

ADVENT AT SAINT BRIDE'S

There will be an additional Mass on the Mondays and Fridays of Advent, a Rorate Coeli Mass, by candlelight, at 7am. Traditionally celebrated just before dawn in Advent as a devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. The Church is only lit by candles, representing Mary's role in bringing the Light of the World into the darkness of the world. As a votive Mass for the Blessed Mother, white vestments are worn instead of the violet normally used during Advent. Father Campbell, Parish Priest of Our Lady of Lourdes, has asked us to advertise the fact that there will a Rorate Coeli Mass on the Tuesdays of Advent at 7am in Our Lady of Lourdes Parish.

CONFESSION TIMES BEFORE CHRISTMAS - ADVENT QUIET DAY



We are not permitted to have General Absolution this year again. So, on Saturday the 21st of December, Saint Bride's will have an Advent Quiet Day - the Church, specially decorated for the Season, will have Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, from the end of 10am Mass until the Vigil Mass.

There will be Confessions from 9.30am until 9.50am.

Then Confessions all day from the end of 10am Mass until 4.20pm; and after the Vigil Mass until 5.45pm.

There will be a number of visiting priests - we will publish the schedule of Confessors next weekend. To help us make a good Confession, printed Examinations of Conscience will be available.

At 1pm there will be the Rosary and 2pm *Prayer During the Day* from the *Divine Office* to help us focus on preparing for Christmas.

Please consider making a new start with God and with those around you, by making a good Confession. It may be a long time since you were last at Confession... Come and experience the healing power of God's mercy.

CHURCH CLEANING FOR CHRISTMAS



CALENDAR



Monday is the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception, the dogma defined by Pope Pius IX in 1854. See above. Pope Francis added the Memorial of Our Lady of Loreto to the Universal Calendar several years ago. The title Our Lady of Loreto refers to the Holy

House of Loreto, the house where Our Lady was born, and in which the Word was made flesh at the Annunciation. Tradition says that the house was brought from the Holy Land to Loreto in Italy in 1294. It was this translation of the Holy House and the longstanding of the structure Our Lady of Loreto is the patron of builders and construction workers. It is the first shrine of international renown and the Popes have always held the Shrine of Loreto in special esteem, and it is under their direct protection.

Wednesday is the Memorial of Saint Damasus I (+384) on Wednesday. A learned man, well versed in the Scriptures, he commissioned Saint Jerome to complete the translation of the Bible into Latin. Shortly after his reign the sefventy-two books of the Bible, hitherto scattered in different parts of the near East, were collected into one volume. Mass. Thursday is the Memorial of Saint Lucy (+304). Born in Syracuse, Sicily, she was of a noble Greek family, and was brought up as a Christian by her mother, who was miraculously cured at the shrine of Saint Agatha in Catania. Lucy made a vow of virginity and distributed her wealth to the poor. She was denounced to the Governor of Sicily and put to death by the sword. Her name means light - and she is patron saint of those who have problems with the sense of sight. We have a relic of Saint Lucy - so we will offer the traditional Blessing of Eyes after Mass today.
