



THE BASILICA OF THE HOLY SEPULCHRE IN JERUSALEM AND THE TRUE CROSS

Sandwiched between the feasts of Saint Patrick, 17th March and Saint Joseph, 19th March, is the memorial of Saint Cyril of Jerusalem - the fourth century bishop who gave us 'The Great Week', better known as 'Holy Week'. At the heart of the liturgical life of Jerusalem in those days was the Basilica of the Holy Sepulchre, a place that is closely linked with the Feast which falls on Saturday of the week, the Exaltation of the Holy Cross.

When the Emperor Constantine favoured Christianity in 312AD, Christians were able to travel freely to the Holy Land for the first time to see the places associated with Our Lord. Constantine, and his mother Saint Helen, were among the first to visit Jerusalem. He ordered archaeological digging to uncover the holy sites which had been profaned the Roman armies when Jerusalem was sacked in 70AD, in order to obliterate any trace of Christianity. These places were easily identifiable, because Temples to the Roman Gods had been built on top of them.



Among the sites discovered was Mount Calvary and the place of the Resurrection. Part of the wood of the Cross, which had been buried by the disciples after the Crucifixion, was also apparently uncovered. Resultingly, Constantine had ambitious plans drawn-up for

a magnificent Basilica to be erected, that would cover the entire area under one roof. It proportions were huge and its adornments like nothing that he been seen in the ancient world. Egeria, the fourth century Spanish pilgrim nun, who saw the Basilica first hand, records in her *Itinerarium* (Travelogue) the splendour of this building - the finest and most highly decorated Church of its day.

The Basilica was dedicated on the 14th September 336AD, amid elaborate ceremonial. At the heart of the Basilica was the *Martyrion* - the place where the *Lignum Crucis*, the wood of the True Cross, was on permanent display for veneration. Part of the wood was taken to Rome, and from this, the relics of the True Cross were dispersed around the world. So, the feast of the Exaltation of the True Cross, is kept on the date the Basilica was dedicated in 336AD.

The original Basilica was destroyed in the twelfth century, and has been rebuilt several times since. The present Basilica dates from the eighteenth century and is still visited today by pilgrims from all over the world.

The name of the Scottish Parliament in Edinburgh is called *Holyrood* - which actually means 'Holy Cross'. Saint Margaret of Scotland (+1293) - granddaughter of the King of England, and who was born in Hungary - fled to Scotland in 1066, during the Norman Conquest. She

married the King of Scotland, Malcolm Canmore III. She is said to have brought with her the 'Holy Rood', a fragment of the True Cross. Her son, King David I, built Holyrood Abbey in Edinburgh after her death to house the precious relic. It was taken from Scotland, along with the Stone of Scone, amongst other priceless objects, by Edward I in 1298, but returned during the reign of Edward II (he of "proud Edward's Army" fame in the unofficial anthem, Flower of Scotland) in 1328. The Relic of the True Cross was presumably destroyed during the Reformation in the sixteenth century.

In 2023, two fragments of the True Cross were gifted by Pope Francis to King Charles on the occasion of his Coronation. The fragments were placed inside the so-called *Cross of Wales*, a newly fashioned Processional Cross, that was used to lead the king into Westminster Abbey for the coronation ceremony. Around the cross are words of Saint David, patron of Wales: "Be joyful. Keep the faith. Do the little things." The Cross is shared between the Anglican and Roman Catholic Churches in Wales today.

We are privileged to have at Saint Bride's a Relic of the True Cross, gifted to us by a family in the parish. After Mass on Saturday morning, and at Masses over the weekend, I will offer individual blessings with the Relic and an opportunity to venerate it for those who wish. Father McGachey

TODAY, 8th SEPTEMBER - FEAST OF OUR LADY'S BIRTHDAY



The Church celebrates today the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary, nine months after the 8th December, her Immaculate Conception. Our Lady was the child of Joachim and Anne, and although the circumstances her infancy is not recorded in the Bible, they are mentioned in other documents, oft quoted by Christian writers of the early Church.

For example, the *Protoevangelium of James*, written in the early second century. describes Mary's father as a wealthy member of one of the Twelve Tribes of Israel. With his wife, he was grieved, by their childlessness. So, they began to devote themselves to prayer and fasting, initially wondering whether their inability to conceive a child might signify God's displeasure with them. After Mary's birth, Anne made a sanctuary in the child's room, and allowed nothing unclean to enter on account of the special holiness of the girl. When she was one year old, her father laid on a great feast, and invited the priests of the Temple, who subsequently decided that she would be offered to God for the rest of her life.

Saint Augustine described the birth of Mary as an event of cosmic and historic significance, and an appropriate prelude to the birth of Christ: "She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley".

If you can, today the end of Mass, spend a moment today before Our Lady's altar, where the newly repainted Statue sits, and offer her your own birthday gift.



CALENDAR



On Monday the Church celebrates the memorial of Saint Peter Claver (+1654) [pictured]. Born in Catalonia, Spain, he became a Jesuit priest. He was sent to Colombia in 1610, and dedicated himself to the service of black slaves: for thirty-three years he cared for the sick and dying, and instructing the slaves through catechists. He is the Patron of the African Missions. Thursday is the memorial of the Most Holy Name of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Saint Bernard, in the Middle Ages, said of Mary: "Look to the star of the sea, call upon Mary... in danger, in distress, in doubt, call upon Mary. May her name never be far from your lips. If you follow her, you will not stray; if you pray to her, you will not despair; if

you turn your thoughts to her, you will not err." Saint John Chrysostom (+407) is remembered on Friday. His eloquence earned him the surname of *chrysostom*, or golden mouthed. As Archbishop of Constantinople, his courageous stance against the vices of the wealthy caused him to be exiled several times. Saturday is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. It commemorates the recovery of the Holy Cross, which had been discovered by Saint Helena, mother of the emperor Constantine in the fourth century - see front cover.
