Saint Augustine of Hippo - Feast Day on Thursday

n Thursday we remember the great of Saint Augustine. Sometimes nowadays parents and grandparents look on perplexed as they witness the choices made by their loved ones - choices where God and the Church rarely figure. Often, they are tempted to think that they have failed their families and that God has deserted them. Augustine is a beacon of hope not only for parents and grandparents, but for children and grandchildren too, because he was able to turn his life around in the direction of God.

Augustine was born in 354 in Tagaste (Algeria), to a pagan father, Patricius and a Christian mother, Monica; his brother and sister were Navigius and Perpetua. At the age of eleven Augustine was sent to school at Madaurus; he had brains to burn, but he fell in with the wrong crowd. In his autobiography, the *Confessions*, he says that he stole and lacked respect for his elders and their property, including his parents. While studying n Carthage (Tunisia), he began a relationship that lasted fifteen years with a young woman whom he



never names. Together they had a child, a boy, whom they called Adeodatus, who would die when he was eighteen years of age.

He taught Grammar for a while in Tagaste (373-4) and then moved back to Carthage where he was head of a school of Rhetoric for the next nine years. All the while, a frantic Monica pleaded with him to settle down and receive baptism. Instead, he became part of a popular sect called Manicheism (with Christian and pagan elements, it reduces everything to a struggle between

good and evil, without a mention of God). A priest counselled Monica that "the son of so many tears, could never be lost by God, but that in his own way, and in his own time, he would bring him to himself."

Augustine went to Rome, and then to Milan, in 384. One day, while passing a church, he was drawn by the music coming from inside. He describes his heart as melting away, realising the hurt he had caused his parents, and many others too. He was moved to tears by what the Bishop, Saint Ambrose, had to say, and would later write of the experience in the *Confessions*, "Late have I loved you, O Beauty, so ancient and yet so new, late have I loved you." Monica had followed him to Milan, and both became friends of Ambrose.

There are two incidents in his conversion story that are crucial: he was profoundly influenced by reading the life of early third century Saint Anthony of the Desert, who when he read "Go, sell all you have, and give to the poor, and come and follow me", he did just that. Later on, while experiencing the turmoil of his own conversion, Augustine was sitting one day in a garden and heard the voice of a child repeatedly saying, *Tolle*, *lege!* "Take and read!" Augustine Interpreted this as a call from God to take up the Bible and read he opened it at the passage from Paul's Letter to the Romans "Let us live decently as people

do in the daytime...Let your armour be the Lord Jesus Christ." He described this event as, "a light of serenity piercing his darkness and all melting away all doubt."

Augustine with Adeodatus, was baptised by Ambrose at Easter 387. In August that year, Augustine, Monica, Adeodatus and Navigius; they travelled to Ostia outside Rome, with the intention of sailing back to Africa. Monica, however, died at Ostia, but not without giving her family the timeless advice to "Remember me at the altar of God, wherever you may be."

Augustine would later go on to become the Bishop of Hippo. He had to navigate his way through difficult times for the Church for the next thirty years: the Vandals were destroying the Roman Empire; and there were the heresies of Donatism and Pelagianism spreading in North Africa. Augustine would spend a great deal his time writing and preaching. Augustine was seventy-six when the Vandals arrived in North Africa and were at the gates of Hippo as he lay dying. It is often said that he died of a broken heart as he watched the world he had known drift away.

His remains were taken to Sardinia and then to Pavia in northern Italy, where they can still be visited today. Along with Saints Jerome, Ambrose, and Gregory the Great, he is one of the four doctors of the Western Church. His life story should give hope to us all: that God in his own way, in his own time, will bring our loved ones back to himself. Father McGachey
