SAINT LUCY, THE WINTER MARTYR

n the First Eucharistic Prayer, for centuries known as the *Roman Canon*, the Church commemorates seven women who were martyred for the faith in the early centuries; they are: Saints Agatha, Lucy, Agnes, Cecilia, Anastasia, Perpetua and Felicity. Sometimes called the *Winter Martyrs*, their feast days fall between November and February, and the red vestments worn at Mass on these days, brighten the drab, grey days of the season.



Fifteen years ago, I bought the twenty pocket-size volumes of *The Liturgical Year* by the French Benedictine monk Dom Prosper Guéranger (+1875). In his commentary for the feast of Saint Lucy, which is this coming Saturday, 13th December, he writes about these seven women saints, and about the order they are mentioned in in the *Roman Canon*, "Until the time of Saint Gregory the Great (+604), the priest used to say: Perpetua, Felicity, Anastasia, Agnes, Cecilia: but this holy Pontiff, loving Sicily, where he had himself founded six monasteries, inserted in the *Canon* the names of these two Sicilian saints: Agatha of Catania, and Lucy of Syracuse...Out of courtesy, due to strangers, he gave them the precedence over

the two Roman saints, Agnes and Cecilia." Two foreigners (Sicilians) are welcomed into the liturgy and placed before the native (Roman) Saints. Great liturgical hospitality!

As I said, this Saturday is the feast of Saint Lucy. Her story is one of historical fact, embellished with legend. What do we know about her for certain? She was of Greek lineage through her mother, Eutychia; that she lived in Syracuse on the island of Sicily in the fourth century; that her father, who was Roman, died when she was young.

We know too that Christians were still very much in the minority at that time. Lucy's mother tried to arrange a marriage for her with a suitable suitor, Paschasius; we can assume he was pagan. But unknown to him or her mother, Lucy had pledged herself to Christ. The third century had been relatively quiet in terms of persecutions of Christians, and so, when martyrdom was not an option, the desire to consecrate one's life, in chastity to Christ, became a real desire for young Christians.

Lucy's mother had suffered for a long time from a terrible illness. Mother and daughter went to Catania to pray at the tomb of Saint Agatha, a fellow Sicilian, who had died the century before. Lucy also prayed for her mother to change her mind about marriage. Both their prayers were answered: her mother was cured of the illness and, at Agatha's intercession, and she accepted Lucy's decision not to marry.

But Lucy's spurned suitor, Paschasius, denounced her to the authorities as a Christian. To punish her, the Governor planned to force her into prostitution, but when guards went to arrest her, they could not move her, even when they hitched her to a team of oxen. The Governor ordered her to be tortured, including having her eyes torn out of their sockets. Lucy was then stabbed to death with a dagger in the throat.

In paintings and statues, Lucy is often seen holding her eyes on a golden plate. In Dante's *Purgatorio*, she is mentioned because an undesirable suitor wanted to marry her

because of her beautiful eyes. The removal of her eyes during torture, along with her name, which means 'light', meant that she was popularly acclaimed as a patron of the sense of sight, and by extension of the blind, or those with ailments of the eyes.

The story of Lucy and her witness in martyrdom touched a new generation of Christians in the fourth century - just as the story of Agatha had inspired Lucy in her day - and soon veneration to her sprang up in the Church - testified to by the fact that she has been mentioned in the *Roman Canon* for centuries.

Our modern age may look at the short life of Lucy, and the path she chose, as somewhat bizarre. The idea of sacrifice, especially the sacrifice of chastity, would seem alien to many. And yet one dares to hope that the example of Lucy will inspire young men and women to make sacrifices for the sake of others, and above all, for the sake of Christ.

We have a precious relic of Saint Lucy at Saint Bride's, and will offer an individual blessing with it, next weekend, after the Masses on Saturday and Sunday, to anyone who would like to receive it. Saint Lucy martyr, pray for us. Father McGachey



MONDAY 8th OF DECEMBER SOLEMNITY OF THE IMMACULATE CONCEPTION MASS FOR THE SICK

This Solemnity of Our Lady recalls how, when she was conceived in her mother, Saint Anne's womb, was preserved from all stain of Original Sin. She was immaculately conceived - because she was predestined to be the Mother of God's only Son.

Our 10am Mass on Monday will be a Solemn Mass with organ and incense.

During Mass, the Anointing with Oil of the Sacrament of the Sick will be given to anyone who would wish to receive it.

RORATE CAELI MASS - MONDAYS, WEDNESDAYS AND FRIDAYS AT 7am

The Mass is traditionally celebrated just before dawn, in honour of Our Blessed Lady. The Church is illuminated by candles to highlight Mary's role in bringing the Eternal Light, Jesus Christ, into the darkness of the world. A *Rorate Caeli* Mass will be celebrated in our neighbouring parish of Our Lady of Lourdes on the Tuesdays and Thursdays of Advent at 7am.

DEVOTIONS IN HONOUR OF OUR LADY Mondays 8th, 15th and 22nd December 7pm

Gathered at Our Lady's altar we will offer her our day: our joys and sorrows, and ask her to present them to her Son, while commending ourselves to her protection and guidance.

After reciting the Angelus, we will form a torchlight procession and move off to the main part of the Church, where we will recite the Holy Rosary, the Litany of Loreto and conclude with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

EVENING PRAYER FOR ADVENT (VESPERS) TUESDAYS, WEDNESDAYS AND THURSDAYS AT 7pm

Join us at Our Lady's Altar for a simple Evening Prayer - lasting 30 minutes - of hymns, psalms and readings. Please note that we have substituted Sunday evenings for Thursday evenings.
