


# SAINT BRIDE'S PARISH, EAST KILBRIDE

## A SPOONFUL OF HONEY...A BARRELFUL OF VINEGAR

**A**lthough not as well-known as his namesakes Saint Francis of Assisi and Saint Francis Xavier, Saint Francis De Sales, whose feast day falls this coming Saturday, made a valuable contribution during a turbulent period in its history. He was an eminently pastorally minded bishop, an encouraging Spiritual Director, an insightful author and gifted preacher.

Born into a noble family in 1567, in the Savoy region of Eastern France, he was the eldest of twelve children. Benefiting from a fine education in the some of the best schools, he followed his father's wishes and gained a double Doctorate in Civil and Canon (Church) Law at the University of Padua, one of the oldest in Europe. All the while, God was awakening a vocation to the Priesthood in his heart, and probably in a state of tension with his father, who wanted him to follow an alternative path, he was ordained in 1593. As a priest De Sales soon distinguished himself as a fine preacher and through his service of the poor.



The fiery brand of Protestantism called Calvinism (named after its founder John Calvin, who had a major influence in Scotland through the reforms of one of his disciples, John Knox) dominated the east of France and Switzerland. Since the Reformation began, the Catholic Diocese of Geneva had to move its headquarters to Annecy, northwest of Geneva, because it was a Calvinist stronghold.

Seeing great numbers leaving the Church for Calvinism, Francis volunteered to re-evangelise the area, by presenting the Catholic Faith in a new way. He had to struggle against many doors which were shut firmly in his face, not to mention snowy weather, bouts of hunger, nights spent in the open, ambushes, insults and even threats to his life. His new method was to use

the printing press to publish leaflets, which he placed underneath the doors of people's homes, and posters, which he displayed in prominent public places. They presented the basics of the Catholic Faith in simple, concise language. His desire was to win back as many believers as possible to the Catholic Church.

In 1602. he was appointed Bishop of Geneva but could not take possession of his Cathedral because of strong opposition. Based in Annecy. Francis spent himself, without reserve, and through his perseverance, and his mild manner, he enjoyed much success.

While preaching at Dijon, during Lent 1604, Francis noticed a widow, the Baroness Jane Frances de Chantal, listening very attentively to his sermon. After the service he spoke to her. Jane asked Francis to be her Spiritual Director. At first, he was hesitant, but Jane was on a path to deep holiness, and, in directing her, Francis was compelled to deepen his own spirituality too. From the close spiritual friendship that grew between them, and the spiritual direction he gave her, sprung his two famous books: the *Introduction to the Devout Life*, in which he follows an important principle: the call to holiness is not only for contemplative monks or nuns, it is for everyone, including those who live and work in the world, through doing the ordinary things extraordinarily well.

In his *Treatise on the Love of God*, he says that the key to love of God is prayer. For people who lead busy lives, he recommended finding time every day for a period of quiet and simply to talk to God in their own words. The test of prayer, he stated, is a person's actions. He famously said "To be an angel in prayer and a beast in one's relations with other people, is very unworthy and pains God." The worst sins, he believed, were gossip and judging other people: even if we think we do it out of love, we are actually doing it to make ourselves look better, he said. And we should be as gentle and forgiving with ourselves just as we ought to be with others. The two books instant best sellers!

Francis de Sales died on the 28<sup>th</sup> of December 1622 in Lyon, at the age of fifty-two. Because of his writings and his idea of distributing of pamphlets which promoted the faith, Francis de Sales was named patron saint of journalists. In fact, every year since 1967, on his feast day, the Pope issues a Message in preparation for Communications Sunday, the Seventh Sunday of the Easter Season.

Among Francis de Sales famous sayings are the following:

"More good is done by a spoonful of honey than by a barrelful of vinegar".

"Have patience with all things but chiefly have patience with yourself."

"Nothing is so strong as gentleness; nothing so gentle as real strength."

As well as marking in a special way at each of the Masses this weekend, the Feast of Saint Bride, our parish patroness, Sunday the 1<sup>st</sup> of February is the Sunday nearest the Feast of the Presentation in the Temple - see below. We will bless candles for use in our homes at each of the Sunday Masses. These candles, modestly priced, may be purchased, if so desired, to be used in our homes. Every Catholic home should have two blessed candles - a custom of our faith.

## MONDAY 2nd FEBRUARY - FEAST OF THE PRESENTATION OF OUR LORD IN THE TEMPLE

The fortieth day after Christmas and the commemoration of how the infant Jesus was presented by Mary and Joseph, in the Temple in Jerusalem, and met by the elderly Simeon and Anna. For centuries, it has been the day for blessing the candles used in the Church; it is sometimes called Candlemas Day. At the 10am Mass today, we will bless candles for use in the Church over the coming year, followed by a candlelight procession around the Church and sung Mass, with organ and incense. Please join us, if you can, for this beautiful Feast.

## FEAST OF SAINT BLAISE

Saint Blaise was a bishop and martyr who, for many centuries, has been the patron Saint of those with ailments of the throat. We know that Blaise lived in Armenia and was arrested for his Christian faith. While in prison, a woman came with her young son who had a fish bone fixed in his throat. At Blaise's command, the child was able to cough up the bone. He was martyred in 316. By the year 800, the custom of blessing throats, using the blessed candles from the previous day's feast (see above), spread across Europe. The traditional Blessing of Throats will be given at the end of Masses on the weekend of the 31<sup>st</sup> of January and 1<sup>st</sup> of February at 4.30pm and 9.30am and 11.30am Mass, as well as on his feast on the 3<sup>rd</sup> February. The blessing can be received more than once.



## SINCERE THANKS AND FABRIC MATTERS

There was considerable water ingress above the Tabernacle last weekend. Apparently, the flashing around the plate glass window above the area had worn away. It was repaired on Wednesday and hopefully the problem has been solved.

They are daylight sensitive and should switch on automatically. Apologies for any inconvenience. In a similar way, someone had switched off the lights around the Piazza and Chapel House. We have now discovered where these lights are controlled from. They are not daylight sensitive and have to be controlled manually. We must remember to switch them on. If they are not on, please tell us and we will put them on.

Twice this past week I have come into the Church from funerals around 12noon, to discover that all the lights, and some of the heaters, in the Church had been left on from the end of the 10am Mass. Please help us to reduce these costs by keeping a careful eye on their use, and switching them off when not in use, or coming to remind us that they have been left on.
